**COURSE OBJECTIVES:**

This course is an introductory study of the factors that affect relations among nations, including the development of nationalism; the elements that determine national power; the formulation of foreign policy; the art of diplomacy; the history and application of international law; international economics; international organizations; militarism and war; case studies involving the above; and contemporary events in international relations. This course partially satisfies the writing requirements outlined in the General Education Requirements.

*Prerequisite: POS 2041 or equivalent.*

This course provides an overview of the International Political System. Through active learning and critical thinking, students will become familiar with the factors that affect relations among nations. This will include – but is not limited to - an introduction to International Security, the development of nationalism, the elements that determine national power and the formulation of a nation's foreign policy.

Through our coursework, we will examine the art of diplomacy, the evolution of international law, the history of militarism and the modern dilemma of peacekeeping. We will also explore the various factors that drive the International Political Economy and the numerous international organizations that work within the interwoven global environment. Historical, contemporary and current events will be included in our case studies and coursework.

**ATTENDANCE POLICY:**

The college-wide *Attendance Policy* notes that each instructor is to exercise professional judgment and define “active participation” in class (and therefore “attendance”).

It is college policy for the instructor to verify that students are in attendance at least once each week during the first two weeks of class. Students classified as “No Show” for both of the first two weeks will be administratively withdrawn.

Immediately following the 60% point of the term, the instructor will verify which students are “actively participating” in the class (read the Policy below). Students classified as not meeting the criteria for active class participation and attendance will be administratively withdrawn with a “WF”.

Students will be able to withdraw themselves at any time during the term. However, requests submitted after the 60% deadline will result in a “WF”. Students and instructors will automatically receive an e-mail notification to their SPC email whenever a withdrawal occurs.

**ATTENDANCE = ACTIVE PARTICIPATION:**

“Attendance” in this course will be based solely upon successful and consistent completion of required assignments (otherwise referred to as “Active Participation”). For instance, if a student does not complete the required assignments during a certain week, the student will be considered “Absent” for that week.

**RESPECTING OTHERS:** We will be discussing sensitive issues related to politics, international relations and world affairs. The instructor expects students to be highly respectful to one another. The instructor will not tolerate students who are disrespectful or who make inappropriate comments within the discussion assignments (especially comments directed towards other students and their viewpoints).

**PLAGIARISM:** All discussion and written assignments are graded based upon critical thinking and original thought - and all information must be presented in your own words. However, if you wish to use a borrowed fact from an expert source, in order to add additional strength and credibility to your argument or thesis, the borrowed idea - whether quoted or paraphrased - must be cited with proper citations and references using either MLA or APA format. Credit will not be granted for any information that is simply "copied and pasted" – even if properly cited.
