ATTENDANCE POLICY: Instructors will verify that students are in attendance at least once each week during the first two weeks of class. Students classified as "No Show" for both of the first two weeks will be administratively withdrawn.

Immediately following the 60% point of the term, each instructor will verify which students are actively participating in class as defined in the course syllabus. Students classified as not meeting the criteria for active class participation will be administratively withdrawn with a "WF". Students will be able to withdraw themselves at any time during the term. However, requests submitted after the 60% deadline will result in a "WF". Students and instructors will automatically receive an e-mail notification to their SPC email whenever a withdrawal occurs.

Active Participation in this class is defined as on-time completion of weekly assignments/quizzes.

Communication:

Although students are welcome to phone me, I'm not always in my office. The best way to contact me is via email, but please utilize the email within this course. My external college email account receives a lot of SPAM and there is an excellent chance I will never receive your message if you use that account. I teach a number of classes, so please include your course and section number in your email. Again, Do NOT use my external college email account if you need to contact me -- use the email within this course and include your class and section number. I will respond to your email within 24 hours in most instances, and within 48 hours on weekends and holidays.

Examinations:

Your final grade in this course is determined primarily by your performance on the Midterm and Final Exams. The exams are randomly generated from a test bank consisting mostly of multiple choice and true/false questions. Therefore, each student's test will cover the same topics but will be unique. Each exam is worth 100 points and is cumulative, meaning that it may contain any information previously covered. Thus, the final exam will include information that was also on the midterm as well as material learned after the midterm. Please do not email the instructor with requests for information about what will be on the exams. EVERYTHING within the course, including linked material and readings from the textbook is fair game for testing.

Exams taken in Pinellas County will be given at the St. Petersburg College locations listed by eCampus on the date and time stated. Also See the <u>Exam Information</u> for additional details.

Students must complete the exams during the dates and times specified by eCampus. Failure to take an examination will result in a score of 0%, unless the instructor was notified prior to the examination and gives permission for missing it.

If the instructor gives permission for missing an exam, the student must schedule a makeup with the instructor within one week of the date of the original exam or a score of 0% will be given. All makeup exams will be given at the Health Education Center.

A Makeup exam is any exam taken at a time other than the time specified on the homepage. Any exam not taken by two days prior to the date Final Grades are due, as published in the college calendar, will be scored a 0%.

The exams are computer based. You may not bring papers, books, disks, or bags to the examination area. Additionally, you may not view any other webpages, other than the exam until you have submitted the test for grading.

Following the examination, any student may review his/her test within one week. The Final exam may be reviewed up to the first week of the next semester. To review the Midterm Exam, please schedule an appointment with the instructor. To review the Final Exam, please email the instructor prior to the end of the semester in which the test was taken to make an appointment to review the exam the first week of the following semester. All reviews must be conducted at the HEC in Pinellas Park, Florida due to security issues and will NOT be permitted at proctored sites.

EACH STUDENT MUST PASS THE FINAL EXAM TO PASS THE COURSE. Regardless of grades earned during a semester, if a student scores below 70 on the final, the highest grade that will be given for the semester is a D.

Weekly Quizzes:

In an effort to keep students from lagging behind, the instructor will have 14 quizzes corresponding to the lessons in the course. One lesson (quiz) will be due each week. The date each quiz is due is posted in the course schedule. Note that quizzes play minor roles in determining grades, used primarily for attendance purposes and NOT as indicators of your mastery of the section in question. You are responsible for learning far more information in each section than what is contained in the short quizzes. Hence quizzes and assignments are worth only five points each. If you do not submit the quiz or assignment by the time required, the score of 0% will be given and you will be counted absent.

Each quiz is due by 11:59 pm on the night listed in the course schedule, and will no longer be available after this time and date. If you miss a deadline, there will be no makeup quizzes or assignments. DO NOT SUBMIT A QUIZ OR ASSIGNMENT UNTIL YOU ARE FINISHED. IF YOU ACCIDENTALLY SUBMIT THE QUIZ BEFORE YOU ARE READY, THE QUIZ WILL NOT BE RESET FOR YOU.

MyCourses software has an internal clock which insures that you complete each quiz on time. Hard drive failures, viruses, down or slow internet connections, power surges, etc. may all be legitimate problems, however, they are modern day equivalents to "the dog eating your homework" and are NOT acceptable excuses.
